

7 Prepositions of TIME

How to say **OD- DO** (desde-hasta) in English

If you know the start AND the end, you can say:

FROM June **TO** September, I will be in Brno.

FROM when I arrived **TO** when I left, it rained.

If you only know the start, say:

STARTING at 4 o'clock, I will be there (**future**)

(**FROM** December 15th.)

I will be on holiday **starting** in July.

I will be making a trailer for the Orli theatre **starting** in January.

I will be reading a book by Stan the man **starting** this evening.

He has/had been here **SINCE** 4 o'clock. (**past**)

I have been playing the violin **since** I was 6.

If you only know the end, say:

She will be there **UNTIL**/(TIL) midnight.

He can talk **until** the cows come home.

Problems with deadlines (lhůty/plazos):

He has to find a new flat **BY** the end of the month.

He will finish the report **WITHIN** a week.

Dasha will finish reading the book **within** 2 months.

The doctor gave him medicine, and he felt better **within** a few days.

WITHIN a period of time

BY a precise time/date

By mid-May
